Banks:

Hours are generally Mon-Fri, 9.30am - 4.30pm with some opening Sat mornings. Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs) dispense cash at hundreds of locations - banks, garages, and shopping centres. Using a credit card in an ATM is an easy way of obtaining sterling if you are travelling from the Republic of Ireland or from abroad.

Newspapers:

Belfast is unusual in having three dailies, Belfast Telegraph, Irish News and Newsletter, as well as the Sunday Life. All have daily entertainment listings. The monthly events guide 'Whatabout?' provides a detailed definitive guide to the city, and is available in all airports, ferry terminals, bus & train stations, hotels and from the Belfast Welcome Centre.

Phone Numbers:

The Northern Ireland Dialling Code (028) or (28) is used as a prefix when dialling from outside the region, or when making internal calls using a mobile phone. All Belfast numbers are composed of (028) followed by 90 and six digits. Eg. Belfast Welcome Centre: (0)28 9024 6609

Pub Hours :

Generally Mon-Sat, 11.30am-11pm, Sundays, 12.30-10pm. Many bars in Belfast have later opening hours on Thurs- Sat nights. Children are not permitted on licensed premises. No alcohol may be served to under 18s.

Shopping Hours :

City Centre Shops generally open Mon- Sat, 9.30am-7pm (Thurs. until 9pm). Some larger stores open Sun 1-6pm. Neighbourhood stores and garage forecourt convenience shops often open much longer - 24 hours in many cases.

Smoking:

No smoking applies on public transport or in most public buildings. More and more restaurants have a no-smoking policy; most have a smoke free area.

Tipping:

It is now a generally accepted practice in restaurants to leave a gratuity of 10-15 per cent for good service. Some restaurants may add on a obligatory 10 or 12.5 per cent service charge on large group bookings.

Rain

Annual rainfall is about 1,070mm (42 ins) and is well distributed throughout the year.

Clothing

Ireland has high rainfall and can be cold so please make sure you check the weather forecast and bring a warm, waterproof coat – especially in winter.

About Dungannon

Dungannon lies in the centre of Northern Ireland, 42 miles west of Belfast on the M1 motorway. The town itself is a prosperous market town and the administrative centre of the District. The service sector is the main source of employment in the area, accounting for 54% of the working population. Within this figure, 32% are employed in government offices and departments.

Manufacturing is a key growth sector in the region. Companies in the area produce agricultural machinery, clothing and childrenswear, bricks, concrete and building products, and food processing is also prominent. Agriculture is a major industry, and the main types of farming are beef, sheep and dairying. Pigs, poultry, crops and horticulture are also significant.

There are several local indigenous companies with an international reputation, such as Moy Park, Moygashel, Dungannon Meats, Masterkreen, Tyrone Crystal and of course Powerscreen.

About Belfast

Belfast, Northern Ireland's capital city, is situated where the river Lagan meets Belfast Lough. Today ambitious plans are underway to transform the face of the city. Urban developments such as the £500m Lagside Development, which incorporated the new Waterfront Hall, BT Tower, Hilton Hotel and schemes at Lagan Weir, Clarendon Dock, the Gasworks and Cathedral Quarter all demonstrate a city with confidence.

Belfast is home the Harland & Wolff shipbuilders and Bombardier Shorts aircraft and missile works. It is still the centre of the Province's engineering industry, but in recent years there has been a substantial diversification in the industrial base. The Industrial Development Board for Northern Ireland provides inward investors with one of the best incentive packages in Europe. Belfast is Northern Ireland's main sea port and boasts the world's largest dry dock, and the City Airport has many UK destinations as well as direct rail links to Dublin and Londonderry.

Belfast has undergone major tourism development within the last few years, resulting in the city attracting 350,000 staying visitors per year, spending £80m and creating 5,000 jobs.

The bedstock within the city has increased from 900 to over 3,000 in the space of four years. This is mainly due to international chains establishing themselves in Belfast such as the Hilton Hotel group, the Holiday Inn group, as well as the Jury's group and Northern Ireland's own Hastings Hotels.

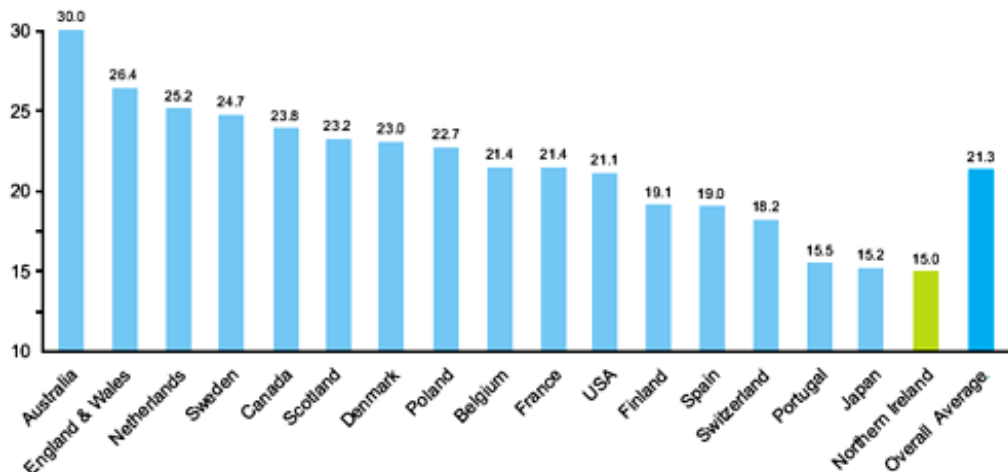
Belfast is also home to the new £110m Odyssey complex.

Is it safe to visit Northern Ireland?

Yes, of course!

Despite years of media focus on 'The Troubles', Northern Ireland is a safe place to live and visit. **It has the lowest crime victimisation rate in the world**, according to the 2000 International Crime Victimization Survey (ICVS). This survey is compiled every 4 years by the United Nations Interregional Crime & Justice Research Institute.

As demonstrated by the graph below, Northern Ireland has emerged from its troubled past and is now among the countries with the lowest rate of violent deaths.

The risk of being a victim of crime in Northern Ireland is substantially lower than in England and Wales. Figures show that in 2002/03, the victim of crime rate in England and Wales was 34% higher than in Northern Ireland.

Powerscreen International Distribution Ltd Health And Safety Policy Statement

The Health and Safety at Work (Northern Ireland) Order 1978 imposes a statutory duty on Employers to ensure in so far as is reasonably practicable the Health and Safety of their Employees whilst at work. This duty also extends to others who may be affected by that work.

Employees also have a statutory duty to take care of themselves and others who may be affected by their acts or omissions.

To enable these duties to be carried out, it is our intent to ensure that responsibilities for health and safety matters are effectively assigned, accepted and fulfilled at all levels within our organisational structure.

1. We will, so far as it is reasonably practicable, ensure that:
 - Adequate resources are provided to ensure that proper provision can be made for Health and Safety
 - Risk assessments are carried out and periodically reviewed
 - Systems of work are provided and maintained that are safe and without risks to health
 - Arrangements for use, handling, storage and transport of articles and substances for use at work are safe and without risks to health.
 - All employees are provided with such information, instruction, training and supervision as is necessary to secure their Safety and Health at work and the safety of others who may be affected by their actions
 - Where appropriate, health surveillance will be provided for employees
 - The provision and maintenance of all plant, machinery and equipment is safe and without risk to health
 - The working environment of all employees is safe and without risks to health and that adequate provision is made with regard to the facilities and arrangements for their welfare at work.
 - The place of work is safe access to and egress from the work place
 - Monitoring activities are undertaken to maintain agreed standards
2. It is the duty of all employees at work:
 - To take reasonable care for the Health and Safety of themselves and of other persons who may be affected by their acts or omissions at work and co-operate with us in fulfilling our statutory duties.
 - Not to interfere with or misuse anything provided in the interest of Health and Safety
3. General:
 - This Health and Safety Policy will be reviewed at least annually, amended and updated as and when necessary. Communication of any such changes will be made to all employees.
 - There are established and maintained effective procedures for consultation and communication between all levels of management and employees on all matters relating to health, safety and welfare
 - Detailed reference information for employees can be found in the Employee Information Manual which is kept in the Safety co-ordinator's Office.
